The weather on the morning of the village fete was perfect and saw a group of loyal helpers on The Town Croft completing the task of setting up for the fete, which they had commenced the day before. Despite agreeing this would be a smaller fete than previously in order to test the water as to the enthusiasm for such an event after two fallow years, the Croft seemed just as full this year, and indeed, at 12.00 noon, when the doors opened they came in hundreds, perhaps encouraged by Zippy and his puppeteer Ronnie Le Drew who later introduced Sooty and Sweep to the audience. Entrance was by donation and people were really generous. There were an amazing number of stalls selling a wide variety of goods, live music, an incredible variety of food plus tea and cakes in the pavilion. The sideshows proved very popular with the youngsters. The long -established Beer Tent was very busy with wine, soft drinks and it seemed Pimms was a very popular choice. The Hartfield Dog

Show has built up a great reputation and the dog show ring was packed. All the children's entertainment and sideshows were, as always, very popular in a country show as were the wonderful vintage vehicles. You may already have seen something about this initiative to create a network of nature recovery corridors from the Sussex Coast up to the Ashdown Forest with the aim of boosting biodiversity alongside food production and thriving communities. This is in the planning stages and would be a continuous area of land stretching from Ashdown Forest to Climping Gap via Wakehurst and Knepp. It would provide a nature rich corridor aiming to protect and restore the local environment and allow wildlife migration and form a vital part of a Sussex wide nature recovery network. ASHDOWN FOREST UPDATE – Councillor Jo Sanders

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Forest

A main topic of discussion at the Ashdown Forest Parish Liaison meeting in October was the imminent introduction of car parking charges. The absolute necessity for this following East Sussex Council's withdrawal of funding for the forest was reiterated. Charges are : Day Pass £5, a 6 month Winter Pass £50 and an Annual Pass £80 (with reductions for certain groups). This covers two cars per household. Annual passes can be obtained via the parking company website (details on Ashdown Forest website). In car parks payment can be by

smart phone app or other mobile via call, card machines at the Forest Centre car park and cash during centre opening hours. Extensive testing using all phones has taken place at all car parks so hopefully there will be few problems with phone signals. By the time of this newsletter the parking charges should have been in place for a couple of weeks. Obviously in this teething period the Conservators are expecting some issues such as possible parking on verges but the evidence from similar areas that have had to introduce parking charges are that these problems dissipate over the first few weeks.

COST OF LIVING CRISIS – ACTION AND LINKS TO HELP - Clerk to the Council Emma Fulham

The Parish Council is funding a warm hub at the Village Hall who are offering free space in the Inkpen Room on the 1st 3rd and 4th Wednesdays for people to have refreshments and chat between 10am and 2pm. On the 2nd Wednesday there is a Village Lunch to which all are welcome.

Final arrangements are being made and will be publicised on Facebook and our Website and noticeboards. There are also lovely community spaces available at the Church Street Café on the 1st and 3rd Thursday afternoons 2-4pm and the Holy Trinity popular cafe on the 2nd and 4th Thursday mornings of the month. HIGHWAYS – Councillor Mike Colenutt

The Parish Council are hoping that in their budget for 2023 they will be able to provide a speed indicator device that can be used at sites around the village as agreed with East Sussex highways. The device would be attached to street signs and can be moved to other locations. We see these in other villages in the surrounding area. How they work is the sign is green with a smile for being within the limit and red for exceeding, and the hope is that drivers will reduce speed accordingly.

We are still keen to set up a Community Speedwatch group within the village and are looking for someone who is able to gather together some volunteers to spend a few hours from time to time to monitor traffic. Please contact our clerk if you can help.

HOLTYE NEWS – Councillor Charlotte Beare

We are very grateful to the Holtye Golf Club for allowing the Parish Council to place a notice board on the wall of the club house at the entrance to the car park. This allows Holtye residents to be up to date with Parish news without having to visit Goods Yard House. You may have noticed the finger post opposite Holtye Golf Club was in a very sorry state of repair during the summer, it is now good as new and looking very smart. We would also ask anyone using the A264 travelling to East Grinstead or in the opposite direction to please take care when driving through Holtye, coming past the White House (the old White Horse pub) on the long straight by the golf course, and the cross roads by the war memorial. It is a tempting road to use to overtake slower traffic and cyclists but unfortunately there have been a number of accidents including a fatality.

COMMUNITY SPEEEDWATCH VOLUNTEER AND COORDINATOR FOR HARTFIELD – Sussex Police

Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where proactive members of local communities join with the support and supervision of their local police to record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices. Registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit are contacted - initially with a letter explaining the potential risks and consequences of their dangerous behaviour. Repeat offenders will receive a visit from the local police, irrespective of where they live. Beyond these friendly gestures, focused enforcement and criminal prosecution follow based on the collated evidence. The role requires a few hours a week and full training is given by Sussex Police on behalf of the Parish Council, the area initially to be covered will be Jib Jacks Hill and Cat Street. The group is approved and has several willing volunteers but just needs a coordinator. PARISH COUNCIL FINANCE AND ASSET NEWS – Clerk to the Council Emma Fulham

The Parish Council continues to work on its strategic plan encompassing improvements to sustainability, highways safety, parish assets and community projects. This year has seen solar lighting added to the Croft Barn and the bus shelters. LED lighting has been installed at the pavilion and the Parish Council continues to seek energy and cost efficiency. The newsletter has been issued prior to the final budget setting for 2023/24 and whilst the Council strives for costs efficiencies, contractor and maintenance costs of the parish assets have risen dramatically with the current high levels of inflation, currently close



to 10%. This will mean a precept increase to cover the basic costs, though the Parish element of our council tax is only a small proportion of the total bill.

The Parish Council has arranged refurbishment of all the fingerposts within the Parish and has arranged all the insurance repairs following Storm Eunice in the Spring.

We have received some community infrastructure levy, which is an offset payment from the building of new homes. This can be used for future capital projects over the following five years but cannot be used for day to day running costs. The Parish Council this year contributed just over £5000 to community initiatives to support groups locally. These include the local sports and youth clubs and Wealdlink. For 2023 grant scheme, please check the Parish Council website for forms in February. The Annual meeting will return in April 2023 to show case local groups and you can register your interest at the same time as you submit a grant application or simply by email

It was renamed the Honey Run due to the local connection to Winnie the Pooh and with the addition of a half marathon event, its aim remains to raise funds for the youth and also to support the Ashdown Forest. Honey related prizes for competitors and some real running challenges for all abilities made this a great event. Over £1500 was raised by muddy trainers and everyone seemed to like the new format and the course.
